MEET YOUR 2023 CITIZENS OF THE YEAR

Willoughby City Council has celebrated the significant achievements of four community members who've been honoured at the recent 2023 Citizen of the Year awards.

At a citizenship ceremony held on Australia Day, attended by 100 new Willoughby citizens from 15 different countries, Willoughby Mayor Tanya Taylor announced the four Willoughby Citizens of the Year award winners.

These were:

- Maria Chan Citizen of the Year
- Lucy Periera Young Citizen of the Year
- Meredith Foley Environmental Citizen or the Year
- Mary Anne Veliscek Cultural and Community Development Award

"I congratulate our four award winners for their tremendous contribution to the Willoughby community, which has included helping our youth, people with disabilities, the elderly, our environment and local residents from multi-cultural backgrounds," Mayor Taylor said.

Maria Chan came to Australia in 1977 and has resided in Willoughby ever since. Maria is the President and Chartered Member of the Rotary Club Chatswood International and has worked diligently with the local Willoughby community to raise funds for various local projects.

Maria has provided local pensioners and the elderly access to her aged care service and offers to accompany those who are lonely and in need of a friend.

Maria is also the Vice Chair of the Multicultural Community Council of NSW and President of the Chinese Community Council. She has worked tirelessly to help the Chinese

Community – both in Willoughby and Sydney at large – by advocating their working rights and supporting their needs.

Lucy Periera has been part of the Chatswood Youth Centre volunteer management team for more than three years and is also part of the Willoughby Youth Action Group. Lucy has a passion for social change and LGBTIQ+ rights.

"Lucy is a strong youth advocate, taking up every opportunity to learn new skills, attend youth events and represent the Council at youth advisory conferences and Willoughby student exchange programs," Mayor Taylor said.

Lucy leads student support initiatives and contributes to youth projects, like the Willoughby Youth Action Plan project, and many other volunteering initiatives through her school.

Meredith Foley (main image) has been awarded for her outstanding commitment to environmental conservation through her involvement with the Willoughby Environmental Protection Association (WEPA) as well as her active involvement with many of Council community events, including the Fauna Fair, National Tree Day and many school excursions.

"Meredith is also recognised for her amazing wildlife photography, which has been produced and distributed to the community, through social media and Council's events and documentation," Mayor Taylor said.

Mary Anne Veliscek is a member of the Market Gardens Park Community Garden. She is responsible for initiating the building of raised garden beds at the garden to accommodate users with physical disabilities to get involved with gardening.

Mary Anne and her husband and engineer David Carolan (who designed the beds) have worked extremely hard to make these accessible garden beds a reality. Mary Anne successfully secured funding for the construction of the garden beds through the Community Grants Program with the garden beds constructed with help from other members of the group in late September/October 2021.

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The year 2023 has opened at a great pace, with your Naremburn Progress Association involved in several issues and events. Of course, the level of involvement always depends on the availability and willingness of volunteers to assist wherever and whenever they can. So, it's been particularly challenging over the past few months as several our volunteers have had to step back for various reasons, due to moving house or changed work obligations.

For these reasons, we've shuffled some people into interim positions within the executive committee, and we're still looking for people to get involved in some of our subcommittees – especially the *Naremburn Matters* subcommittee.

Most of the interim appointments extend only until our annual general meeting (AGM) on 27 April. At the meeting, all positions will be declared vacant, and financial members of the association will vote to elect nominated members for another 12 months. We urge members to take a more active role in the NPA – we're happy to find suitable roles for just about anybody!

As part of our reorganisation of volunteer resources, we welcome two new members to our committee: Himashi Cameron and Pete Kasby. Himashi has tertiary qualifications in statistics and corporate law and has recently returned to Naremburn after five years in Singapore. She's married, has two children at Cammeray Public School, and is already involved in several community groups.

Pete Kasby has been a resident of Naremburn for eight years and has been involved with the NPA for about a year. He has also been active as Vice President of the Willoughby Community Preschool for the past two years as well as a committee

member. He's a member of the Cammeray Public School Parents & Citizens and Environment & Sustainability committees and was recently appointed tunnels representative. We are fortunate to have secured the services of these new members and welcome them to our ranks

Naremburn Local Centre Streetscape Project

The NPA recently received two design proposal options from Willoughby Council officers for upgrading the public area adjacent to the Naremburn shops. Council presented the options at consultation sessions to gauge community reaction.

The feedback to Willoughby Council and its design consultants was generally favourable, but any final layout must address the following:

- NPA seeks the continuation and improvement of our great village atmosphere; any further development proposals should be of only moderate height, density, or both, as per earlier concept plans.
- NPA is keen to see the project completed as soon as possible, as we have identified it as much-needed for years. Over many years, major road infrastructure projects have decimated Naremburn Local Centre ("the Naremburn Shops"), so the community is striving to maintain and improve the remaining shopping strip.
- NPA strongly supports Willoughby Council's endeavours to begin the construction phase of this project.

- The federal government originally provided funding on a "use it or lose it" basis, so concerns arose when progress faltered; the NPA has regularly followed up with emails since September 2021. We are seeking written commitment from Willoughby Council and the federal government that funding is not at risk because of timing delays. To date, although verbal confirmation is strong, we have nothing in writing.
- NPA wishes to preserve shop facades for their cultural significance and heritage.
- One of the principal requests as per community feedback is the need for noise barriers, which are missing from both of the latest options. Final layouts must address the noise issue; these barriers will be necessary if the proposed major roads infrastructure projects proceed, as Willoughby Road will become the major feeder for southside harbour destinations when works curtail Brook Street and Miller Street access points.
- The local community recognises and appreciates the incorporation of an enhanced public area into the design options, with levelled seating options (as



opposed to the current sloped aspect), more trees for increased shade and fewer urban heat effects, and improved pedestrian safety.

- If the project introduces angled parking on Rohan Street, the community is divided as to whether this leads to any improvements.
- Although not directly part of the streetscape project, the community still seeks a safe and proper pedestrian crossing over Willoughby Road to cater to school children and commuter and local resident foot traffic.

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FWPA meets with TfNSW: a progress report

On 6 February, the Federation of Willoughby Progress Associations (FWPA) met with the Transport for NSW (TfNSW) Warringah Freeway Upgrade and Western Harbour Tunnel (WHT) project team.

The FWPA's objective was to seek clarity on the impact of the local road network from the Warringah Freeway Upgrade and the WHT projects.

Departmental officers from TfNSW would not put the Beaches Link project on the agenda, as the NSW Government had not signed off on the environmental impact statement (EIS) that would allow that project to begin.

The meeting agenda that the department issued included the environmental issues associated with the WHT and Warringah Freeway Upgrade. This made for a very full agenda for a two-hour meeting.

WHAT DID THE MEETING CLARIFY?

The department provided clarification on changes to on-ramp access to the Sydney Harbour Bridge (SHB) and the Sydney Harbour Tunnel (SHT). The key changes are:

Southbound

1. The Brook Street on ramp will not provide access to the SHT. Currently, it provides access to the SHB/Cahill

Expressway and the SHT.

- 2. Earnest St will not provide access to the SHB or Cahill Expressway Southbound.
- 3. Falcon St will not provide access to Cahill Expressway southbound.
- 4. Access to the WHT will be added via Willoughby Rd (or Berry St, North Sydney), creating a rat run for those commuters wishing to enter the WHT.

Northbound

- 5. Commuters will not be able to exit to Miller or Brook St from the SHT, which risks more traffic being pushed onto Willoughby Rd.
- 6. Commuters will not be able to exit the WHT to Miller or Brook St, pushing more traffic to Willoughby Rd.
- 7. Falcon St westbound exit from the SHB will be closed, pushing more traffic into Cammeray and impacting what is known as the "Eastern Valley Way" route through Cammeray/Northbridge.

Concern was expressed that these changes stand to have a considerable impact on local traffic and will place greater pressure on the Cahill Expressway. Vehicular access from Willoughby to the airport will be via the SHB and the Cahill Expressway, where it joins the Eastern Distributor, or a rat run via Northbridge/Cammeray to Earnest

St to access the SHT.

Please note that this is clarification to what was written in the last report in this journal.

The department asserts that it is making these changes for safety reasons rather than the changed road configuration associated with additional tunnel and freeway infrastructure. The FWPA requested traffic incident reports to test the safety issue.

The department presented estimates of road traffic numbers for the year 2037 using different scenarios. The estimates showed considerable traffic increases on High Street, Willoughby and Willoughby Road as well as increases to Eastern Valley Way, Sailors Bay Rd, and Strathallan Ave. The FWPA has requested additional details regarding what gave rise to these estimates.

Significantly, the officers have admitted in the last two meetings that the department has done no detailed traffic modelling for the Willoughby Local Government Area (LGA) in relation to the two projects. Any detailed traffic modelling that the department has done has effectively stopped in and around the on ramps and off ramps!

The length of the traffic presentation meant that we could not cover everything we wanted to cover in the meeting. The department did not





Other Birds by Sarah Addison Allen

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Councillors' reports

Updates from our three Naremburn ward Councillors



Councillor Georgie Roussac

In December, Council approved Willoughby's new Local Environmental Plan (LEP) and Development Control Plan (DCP). The LEP guides future planning decisions to ensure development is designed appropriately. Our new plan includes a number of changes to help us respond to some of the major challenges facing our community's future health and prosperity. Key changes include:

- introducing a design review process to improve the design quality of development
- increasing affordable housing for key workers in new residential developments
- introducing new sustainability measures to mitigate the impact of a changing climate (urban heat) and
- strengthening heritage provisions.

Councillors also supported my request that Council investigate the heritage significance of Naremburn buildings, shops, and the area between the two existing Naremburn Conservation Areas in Council's 2023–24 heritage review.

The LEP and DCP are now with the NSW Department of Planning and Environment for finalisation, which is expected to take approximately six months from lodgement.

Naremburn ward Councillors regularly attend Naremburn Progress Association meetings. NPA meetings provide a great opportunity to discuss issues and meet your neighbours. I'd love to see you there sometime.

With the recent combination of rain and more sunshine than we've enjoyed in years, many of our footpaths and parks are looking a little overgrown. Council staff members are working to improve the backlog, which includes street sweeping, weeding, and mowing, but there's a lot more to do. I encourage residents who see issues that may have been overlooked to contact me so I can have them fixed. To improve accountability, an issue that has been raised with me a lot recently, I have also asked Council staff to investigate publishing the dates that street sweepers and grounds staff will be working in particular areas.

Another issue I am addressing this term of Council is improving the public heritage protections of important neighbourhood locations. I have sought and received my colleagues' support in investigating whether our heritage register should add sites such as the Henry Lawson Cave, the Catholic Presbytery, and the St Leonards School. I know there's a lot of great local knowledge, so if you know of a site that we should be considering for heritage protection, please reach out.

Mayor's report

An update from Willoughby Mayor Tanya Taylor

Naremburn Local Centre Streetscape Upgrade

The Naremburn Local Centre Streetscape Upgrade Project consultation with residents and stakeholders was completed in December 2022. Council is planning to upgrade Naremburn's local business centre and provide easier access for pedestrians, cyclists, and bus passengers. The project will also enhance amenities to improve and extend visitation time to create higher economic activity, aiding business retention and growth.

Thank you to the Naremburn Progress Association and the Naremburn Chamber of Commerce for assisting Council with the distribution of information over the past months. Council widely promoted the project through its communication channels, including the monthly Have Your Say newsletter, which went to 7,070 subscribers. Council also collected feedback after presenting the design concepts at a public meeting that took place at the Naremburn Library as well as at a street stall at Naremburn Town

As always, we are grateful for the valuable

feedback that our community and stakeholders have provided to us. Overall, respondents were in support of the main focus of the presented concept designs. These include new shaded seating areas, changes to traffic circulation with a proposed one-way system to improve pedestrian safety, a separated southbound bike lane to improve cycling safety, and a level leased area. Of our survey respondents, 80% were from Naremburn. We will hold a community information session later this month with construction due to begin late this year.

There's history in causing a FRACAS at Flat Rock Gully

Willoughby Council voted in December 2022 to reinstate the Advisory Committee on Bicentennial Reserve and Flat Rock Gully. It was the latest example of how important protecting this space continues to be to the community. We have to thank Naremburn Councillors: the Naremburn Progress Association; and other community organisations, such as the Willoughby Environmental Protection Association (WEPA), for advocating on behalf of this space. These people and organisations recognise the ongoing need to care for this space and are keenly aware of the fragility of the natural habitat in Flat Rock Gully.

The gully covers approximately 10 hectares and is rich in both natural and cultural heritage. The Australian Museum has found evidence of 6,000 years of habitation in this area. The Cammeraygal lived here, relying on the estuarine tidal flats as a food source.

Eric Wilksch was the President of the NPA in 1988 when he compiled *The Naremburn Story*, which was published for the Bicentennial Committee of Willoughby Municipal Council. Eric, a passionate advocate for protecting Flat Rock, researched the area in detail and documented its flora and fauna.

"When Flat Rock Gully was in imminent danger of being severely ravished, a group of concerned residents close to the gully met in 1976 for the sole purpose of initiating action to save this valuable bush land for posterity," Eric wrote. "It was decided to add a rational voice and support for other similarly motivated groups. The name chosen

for the new organisation was Flat Rock Area Conservation Action Society (FRACAS). FRACAS was soon recognised as a representative voice and became actively involved in the very local issue of bush conservation. It is still in readiness for any resurgence of any activities threatening what remains of the bush in Flat Rock Gully."

In April 2011, an exhibition developed by the Willoughby District Historical Society and Museum was opened by the Mayor, Pat Reilly. This exhibition explored the impact of urban development on the natural environment of Flat Rock Creek. Notably, when drainage works enclosed the creek in a concrete tunnel in 1934, garbage and landfill reaching up to 52 metres was dumped over it. The pristine valley had become a wasteland. Tipping continued until 1985, even though in the 1960s there had been a shift in community attitudes towards the environment. Plus, resident anger grew over the smoke and smell they experienced from the tip.

Into this scenario came FRACAS, focused on conserving Flat Rock Gully. In 1985, Willoughby Council started a plan to reclaim the tip for a modern sporting complex and develop a lineal park from Artarmon Station to Middle Harbour as a Bicentennial project.

Eric Wilksch was recognised for his contribution to the conservation of Flat Rock Gully when bushland regeneration work in the open section of Flat Rock Creek to Tunks Park on Middle Harbour resulted in the opening of the Eric Wilksch Track in 1996.



Today, walkers and joggers continue to enjoy this track and remark on this peaceful space.

Flat Rock Gully provides essential respite for our community. The quality of our surrounding environment plays a critical role in everyday lives. Large residential developments on the Channel Nine site and at Walters Road/Willoughby Road will bring many new residents who will need even more open, connected green space.

The threat to Flat Rock Gully, if the proposed Northern Beaches tunnel dive site is established in this space, cannot be exaggerated. The community knows that rehabilitation of the area will take at least 30 years. The denuding of the Cammeray landscape for the upgrade to the Warringah Freeway is a daily reminder of how we must be prepared to cause a FRACAS! – Alan Waddington

NAREMBURN PLANNING UPDATE

The lowdown on development applications (DAs)

DA2022/200: Council notified the community about this application for extended trading hours to 24/7 by McDonald's at St Leonards station in June 2022. The NPA and residents sent submissions objecting to this proposal. The decision by Council is still pending.

DA2021/189/A: Council notification about planned modifications to the approved adaptive building development at 48 Chandos Street was on 20 May 2022. Several objections were made to this application to change garden space for the affordable housing residents to a commercial suite. The Willoughby Local Planning Panel assessed this proposal on 28 February 2023. NPA members spoke in opposition to the Council assessment. The panel approved the modifications with conditions.

DA 2021/340: 43 Donnelly Road.

Council rejected the development in July 2022. Conciliation by the Land and Environment Court was held on site on 6 February. The President of the NPA argued at the meeting that the court reject this proposal. The matter was adjourned until 21 March when a second conciliation was between Council and the developers. This conciliation failed, and the matter will be decided by the court. On 27 February, Council supported our Councillors' proposal to seek heritage listing of the Presbytery on the site. The conciliation conference in these proceedings was terminated by consent on 21 March. The matter will now proceed to a hearing, and we will provide further information shortly.

If you have concerns about a compliant development, you must contact the private certifier in writing and ask for a written response. Copy Naremburn Councillors into the email. Council has said it will put applications for compliant developments onto its website as soon as they are received.

More on the Naremburn Shops Streetscape project

Council has finalised a report on the public consultation at the end of 2022 about the two proposed design concepts for the Naremburn Shops Streetscape project. Based on the preferred design, a further community consultation session took place on 29 March at the Naremburn Community Centre. A street stall at Naremburn shops provided information on this design on 1 April. This design concept will be online until 20 April on the Council website. – NPA Planning and Environment Subcommittee

really touch upon the environmental issues other than to assert that sediment overflow issues at Cammeray are being managed and that the possible use and mitigation of the Flat Rock Gully dive site was a subject still on the agenda internally.

During the meeting, it was agreed that the North Shore will experience a "degraded level of service" in terms of intersection delay overall. Outside the meeting, two comments were made to different people. The first was that because Willoughby Road is a state road, the NSW Government will not disregard it. This highlights that all other roads are Council roads and that our rat runs and increased traffic flows are not the NSW Government's primary concern. The other comment was that traffic-wise, the Lower North Shore will not be better off as a result of these projects.

WHAT'S NEXT?

The FWPA has requested a further meeting and additional information. The department agreed to provide more information but has not yet done so. The departmental officers have indicated the next meeting will not be until April. The project's traffic officer is leaving the project before then. This is truly a work in progress, with bits of clarification along the way.

There is no clarity as yet as to when these configuration changes will take effect; however it is understood that the changes

are planned whether or not the Beaches Link proceeds.

Based on the agreements reached during the meeting (and with the benefit of maps), the recommended next steps are for TfNSW to:

- 1. provide the diagram of Warringah Freeway changes as well as a detailed cross-section map of all Willoughby connections
- 2. confirm whether it can provide slides to share
- 3. investigate school traffic flows and detailed modelling of main arterial roads into and out of Willoughby
- 4. provide dates for consultation on active transport
- 5. amend the traffic projection tables to include road ceiling capacities
- 6. provide updated traffic accident figures for the Warringah Freeway corridor at the Miller Street/Brook Street end
- 7. schedule an environmental meeting with required experts with reference to the previous letters sent to the Minister
- 8. provide more information on why the Amherst and Brook Street intersection falls to the lowest level of intersection performance (going from an A to F level of service) and the implications to Brook St
- 9. provide information on why High Street traffic increases to such a degree.


Hot off the press

With the NSW election installing a Labor government, we have some assurance that the Beaches Link end of the project is off the table – at least for now. Both parties, however, have supported the Western Harbour Tunnel continuing, which was designed to interlink with the Beaches project. We will seek a rejection of the Beaches Link environmental impact statement (EIS) to ensure that, should the project be reconsidered in future, it is substantively replanned. We will also continue to advocate for the issues previously identified by the NPA, including the filtration of the Cammeray pollution stack, more substantive return of land/ trees, reconsideration of traffic routes, and the need to consider the public/ active transport alternatives. There are well-founded concerns that elements of the Western Harbour Tunnel may need to move farther into Willoughby due to the changed gradient of the tunnelling project. This concern has been raised by engineers due to the change of harbour crossing method announced shortly before the election. Although the win of saving Sydney Harbour from dredging is considerable, the risk that Flat Rock stays in play is not one our community wants to entertain. Please watch this space closely and continue to write to decision-makers.
