# TASTES OF NAREMBURN BRINGS THE COMMUNITY TOGETHER AGAIN

Naremburn residents celebrate and support local businesses



Back for a second year, Tastes of Naremburn brought the community together for an afternoon of live music, great local food and drinks, and socialising in the spring sunshine.

The Naremburn shopping village car park became a car-free zone for a few hours, and hundreds of people filled the space. The car park was transformed with market stalls, outdoor dining, a stage filled with local talents, a jumping castle, kids activities and much more.

#### Supporting local businesses

The Tastes of Naremburn was first thought up in mid-2022 by the Naremburn Progress Association.

The free community event is a chance to reconnect with our neighbours, friends and community whilst supporting our local shops. This was important in 2022 as we emerged from the pandemic lock down and is just as relevant now. We live in a diverse, vibrant village and it's important to celebrate this!

At its heart, the event supports our fantastic local businesses. The Naremburn shopping village has been at the centre of our community for almost 100 years. Now, more than ever, local business needs our support - a thriving local strip of shops is more than just a place to buy a coffee or pastry, it gives a neighbourhood its heart, it's a place to connect, to meet, to share news and more.

The NPA provided free-of-charge stalls to over a dozen local businesses to trade during the event, as well as stall space to another 10 local organisations and not-forprofit groups.

An estimated 1000 people attended Tastes of Naremburn this year, and a quick stroll around the site revealed the local cafes, restaurants and bars were heaving. A number of local businesses which would normally be closed on Sunday afternoon stayed open too.

As we prepare to say farewell to 2023, it's important to reflect on what we have achieved for Naremburn. You will see in this issue that Naremburn Progress Association (NPA) continues to be at the forefront of the big issues. Whether it's protecting our bushland, ensuring road plans make sense or providing input around unsustainable development, the NPA is right there for our community.

As you know the NPA has been operating as a not-for-profit community group since 1901 - it's been a pleasure and joy to work with a small working group this year looking into the history of the Donnelly Rd site. The final decision on the historic site is still pending council's heritage review. We have also challenged the scale of other developer-led projects and had an input into an array of council plans including the plan to upgrade the streetscape. Our work should ensure that our local shops are retained in the face of future development plans (depending on State Government outcomes) the impacts of synthetic grass are fully considered and the tip contamination appropriately managed.

What this means for us isn't yet clear except that the intention is to allow for a higher scale of density - there are reports that council heritage and conservation controls will be overridden. There is no doubt that housing supply and affordability is an issue that needs to be tackled but done poorly these plans are potentially devastating for our little historic suburb. We will be effective in advocating around this issue if we have strong membership support. It's membership and renewal time of year and we would ask that you renew via our website as soon as possible - please share the need to join (or re-join) with your friends and neighbours.

I would like to thank our Ward Councillors for their attendance at our meetings and their feedback on issues raised. All councillors have provided feedback and motions on a wide array of issues. In particular, thank

# What we did to Achieve our Vision for Naremburn in 2023

#### Vision 1. A Dynamic, Safe Suburb

Streets that are safe, connected and usable for locals supported by great active and public transport

- We ran another fantastic Tastes of Naremburn Event to encourage community connection and to promote our wonderful local businesses
- We made submissions asking that the broken active transport link in Naremburn be fixed
- We (with FWPA) met with TfNSW to advocate for better planning around the Warringah Freeway Reconfiguration
- We escalated our bus concerns to the Federation of Willoughby Progress Associations who wrote to decision makers
- We gave feedback to council about their operational and financial plans to upgrade the area
- We advocated for new lights and crossings
- We distributed 3 wonderful issues of Naremburn Matters across 3000 households

#### Vision 2. A Thriving Local Shopping Village

A local centre that is thriving, to scale and attractive

• We gave input into several levels of

consultation around the new Streetscape design now out to tender

- We ran Tastes of Naremburn at the local shops to support local business and bring our community together
- We advocated for planning regulations to be changed to ensure shop fronts are not replaced by residential apartments to ground level

### Vision 3. A Green, Open and Liveable Oasis

A suburb that is sustainable, clean and green – an oasis from over development

- We gave detailed feedback to Council about their Bushland Plan of Management, Bicentennial Reserve Plan of Management and Flat Rock Gully (FRG) Reserve Action Plan
- We advocated against synthetic grass and the expansion of synthetic grass ovals
- We played a big part in the Beaches Link being cancelled and Flat Rock saved from becoming a dive site and Brook St a thoroughfare for spoil trucks
- We advocated against overdevelopment of the area i.e. Walter St and St Leonards over scale developments
- We raised concerns about Willoughby Leisure Centre and Contamination

Management resulting in further investigations - FRG has now been declared as contaminated land by the EPA

- We reported the Fish Kill event and followed up on action (ongoing)
- We advocated for faster DA assessment turn around times for locals

#### Vision 4. A Celebration of Heritage

A suburb that is known to uniquely represent and celebrate the heritage of the North Shore

- We contributed to the LEP/DCP plans for the area requesting council apply greater levels of protection whilst allowing reasonable development
- We successfully advocated for Henry Lawsons Cave to be included into the heritage review
- We successfully lobbied for Donnelly Rd to be placed under an interim heritage order and ran a research project to support permanent heritage registration over the whole site
- We asked Council and our State Representative to provide greater transparency and better outcomes pertaining to developer led complying development
- We requested that the historic name of Naremburn Village and the name of the original inhabitants be recognised in signage

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# Naremburn Local Area - Streetscape Upgrade

In February 2023, Willoughby Council published the results of its community consultation on two design options for the Naremburn Local Area ('The Naremburn Shops') streetscape upgrade.



The consultation results reveal support for an improved streetscape, and varying opinions on what and how this should be done. Among the most supported elements are: new, shaded seating, improved traffic flow (via a one way system), additional outdoor space for pedestrian access, and levelling of dining areas. Opinions were more divided on the issues of parking, including the repurposing of two car parking spaces in the main car park for additional pedestrian space.

A 50% detailed design was released shortly thereafter in March 2023. Key elements of the design are:

- One way traffic flow through the main Quiamong Street car park,
- Willoughby Road entrance to Quiamong Street narrowed to 5.2m allowing for entry only, with increased pedestrian area from the removal of 2 parking spaces,
- Additional parking on Rohan St with five 45° rear to curb parking spots replacing the current three parallel parking spots),
- New bicycle racks and maintenance station on Rohan Street, and
- Renewal of the cafe-leased seating area adjacent to Willoughby Road


With the tender released mid-November and works to begin in the new year, the NPA contacted Willoughby Council with some outstanding questions from the Naremburn community.

NPA: The cafe-leased area to be upgraded is already a levelled area with pedestrian access. Was any consideration given to increasing pedestrian access and levelling the sloped dining areas further down the hill?

WCC: The leased area will be levelled further to enhance outdoor seating and dining. The proposed design will also address safety and pinch points through the space making it more user friendly for the community. Levelling lease zones further down Quiamong St would require use of retaining walls and possibly steps that would impinge on the current space affecting pedestrian movement and the existing outdoor dining areas.

NPA: The Rohan Street pedestrian crossing is a safety concern, due in part to its close proximity to Willoughby Road. The narrowing of Rohan Street (due to additional 45 degree parking) and increased traffic (due to the one way system) will likely increase the risk further. Is there an opportunity to move the crossing away from Willoughby Road to allow cars turning onto Rohan Street sufficient time and space to stop before the crossing?

WCC: This existing crossing at its current location allows for 1 car to rest upon entry and exit within Rohan Street while pedestrians are crossing. Our Infrastructure experts and design consultants have advised that moving the crossing further into Rohan Street would result in a reduction to the current parking numbers within Rohan St. Traffic calming devices including a raised crossing and narrowed speed hump midway down Rohan Street, will slow traffic and increase safety. The use of angled parking on Rohan Street, through narrowing of the road carriageway, will assist in maintaining a low speed environment while maintaining the current level of parking for the Centre.



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The designs aim to improve safety for pedestrians and cyclists in and around the local business centre.

NPA: North Sydney Council has been creating gardens featuring native flowering plant species such as Kangaroo Paw, Eremophila, Acacia and Calistamen. What species of flora will be planted as part of the upgrade?

WCC: Council have included Kangaroo paws, Kangaroo grass, Silver Cushion Bush,

Midgenberry, Coastal Banksia in our designs. The use of Pandoreas to climb the shade structure Dianella grasses, Native River Mint, Gymea Lily and more that will provide for a native flowering landscape within the precinct.

NPA: A bike maintenance station and racks are planned to be installed on Rohan street away from the main cycle path (adjacent to the freeway)? In this design, how should cyclists (including children and families) access these facilities from the main cycle path e.g. cycling around the whole block of shops (Quiamong Street, Glenmore Street and Rohan Street), or via the pedestrian areas which is the most direct route?

WCC: Cyclists will be able to use the existing bicycle racks located on Quiamong St as these will still be available. Cyclists are encouraged to dismount and walk their bike along the pedestrian areas or continue riding along the separated bike lane around the car park adjacent to Willoughby Road that delivers you to the crossing near the Quiamong Street carpark entrance at Willoughby Road.

NPA: Although not directly part of the streetscape project, the community seeks a safe pedestrian crossing over Willoughby Road (near Rohan Street) to cater for school children, commuter and local resident foot traffic, and increasing access to Naremburn Shops.

WCC: We acknowledge that the pedestrian crossing is not part of the streetscape project. In response, Council officers will develop a design in consultation with key stakeholders. Should this proposal receive support, we will proceed with engaging the broader Naremburn Community in a consultation process.

The findings of this consultation will inform the recommendations presented to Local Traffic Committee for review and recommendation to Council for formal approval. The anticipated timeframe for delivery is set for the middle of next year.

# What's Good for the Goose...

The recent opening of the WestConnex Rozelle Interchange provides another timely reminder of what residents in Rozelle will receive after WestConnex, versus what is being offered to the Lower North Shore once the Warringah Freeway and Western Harbour Tunnel projects have concluded.

In response to continued community pressure, the NSW Government announced \$50 million to be spent on redeveloping the former Rozelle Rail Yards into one of the largest green spaces in inner Sydney – the Rozelle Parklands.

In stark contrast, residents of the Lower North Shore will permanently lose 1.5 hectares of public space in Cammeray Park via compulsory acquisition for ongoing motorway operations. A further 2.7 hectares (of Cammeray Park) is yet to be confirmed whether it will be returned to the community, and if so, in what form. In total project documents state that over 7 hectares of vegetated space will be removed for the project - including vegetation in Naremburn.

The Rozelle Parklands site spans 10 hectares and features a new urban forest at its heart and over 3,000 newly planted trees. Pedestrian and cyclist shared user paths will connect into existing active transport links. Other features include a wetland environment, boardwalks, picnic and barbeque areas, large grassed areas for future sporting fields, courts and pitches, bush trails, playgrounds and an amenities building.

Central to the local communities' campaign was the former state member for Balmain, Jamie Parker who announced "For many of us who have endured years of noise, dust, and disruption from WestConnex it is a huge relief to know this 10-hectare site will become a parkland, not more residential development once WestConnex construction is complete."

The Naremburn Progress Association has long been opposed to the Warringah Freeway Upgrade due to the significant detrimental impact the design will have on Naremburn and surrounding communities. The permanent loss of parkland in Cammeray Park, the unfiltered emission stacks and increased congestion on local roads are some of the impacts we face similar to those being experienced with the opening of the Rozelle Interchange. The Naremburn Progress Association calls for all public parkland to be returned to the community, and if this can not be achieved, the creation of new public green space over the freeway via lidding. Lidding has become an increasingly common method of returning green space and amenity to communities.



The new Rozelle Parklands will provide 10 hectares of new green space to residents of the inner west post WestConnex in stark contrast to the lower north shore where 7 hectares of green space is being removed for the Warringah Freeway and Western Harbour Tunnel projects.

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# Are you a Nimby, Yimby ....or Simby?

There has been a sizable shift in the approach to planning with the new Planning Minister reportedly writing to all Mayors demanding more "low and mid-rise homes immediately" (SMH 9/11/23). The intent to change laws to override Council Local Environment Plans (LEPs) has been announced, allowing duplexes, terraces and 1-2 story townhouses in R2 (low density) zones and residential flat buildings in R3 zones (medium density). As we go to print, news agencies are reporting that the zoning changes will impact areas within 1.2km of selected Metro Stations, including Crows Nest - putting Naremburn squarely in view. This approach seems to be driven by the Productivity Commission's August Report which found that infill development "can have lower infrastructure costs than greenfield developments because much of the supporting infrastructure is already present.". Whilst capacity and cost to connect services is considered, the need to upgrade Sydney Water infrastructure across Sydney's oldest suburbs does not seem to factor. Service failures are something Naremburnians have had unfortunate experience with. On the 5th July Sydney Water was ordered to pay a penalty of \$365,625 by the L&E Court for a major 2020 sewerage failure who reported "the incident (was) part of a system initially constructed between 1916 and 1930, comprising some 6,300 kilometres of pipes and still growing" and noted "constraints on the defendant



in relation to its ageing infrastructure and funding of capital expenditure works." Naremburn sits at a major junction in the wider area's sewerage network and it seems reasonable that the community should be asking whether our sewers in their current form can handle more flushing toilets?

Whether the State Government has prioritised and funded these works sufficiently is something NPA will be discussing at an upcoming meeting with Sydney Water.

Increasingly we are seeing the Not in My Back Yard (Nimby) term levelled at anyone who expresses concern. But is this label fair or foul? A new group, often quoted by governments as the "Yimbies", are advocating in support of saying "Yes in My Backyard". Interestingly the organiser of the group has stated that planning should be built on "the idea of community involvement. People in the local community know what they want". At a November 3rd Budget Estimates Hearing the Chair challenged the Planning Minister about "the politics of division". She asked the Minister if he agreed that at the heart of "Nimbyism" was a community "trying very hard to have genuine input into the planning system?" Perhaps it's time to change the label - after all aren't we really all Simbies? We want Sustainability in our Backyard (Simby) - built on sensible planning decisions and services that support future growth.

The "Your Council NSW" website provides some helpful insight into our capacity for further growth – if you compare Willoughby's density to other council areas we are doing our bit, but services and open space are clearly becoming a major issue. With the "Channel 9", Walter St, Chatswood, and St Leonards Developments coming online the NPA have been requesting that Willoughby Council and the State Government take a stronger approach to Master Planning and provide the community with real time dwelling data so we can continue to advocate. This is a request that will continue to be a top priority into the new year.

# Ways to Get the Best from Your GP

#### 1. Love your receptionist

Try to think of the receptionist as your ally. By telling the receptionist what your appointment is for, they can ensure there are fewer wasted appointments. Don't hate them for asking 'is it urgent?'. The receptionist does not expect you to be the judge of how serious your illness is - that's a job for the GP. They are asking if you are okay to wait for a non-urgent appointment. 2. See the right person for the treatment Receptionists know each GPs area of specialisation and can help to avoid wasting GP appointments. For instance, by directing you to the travel clinic and travel vaccine to the relevant health care assistant (Nurse). It is useful to see the same GP on subsequent visits.

#### 3. Think like a GP

When a GP asks 'how are you today?', they really want to know your main problem. When they ask 'what are you hoping I do?', this is not the GP's way of telling you that they don't have a clue, but they are trying to understand what expectations you have so they can best meet them. Be realistic – asking about several unrelated ailments may mean you need more than one appointment.



#### 4. Prioritise your symptoms

What is the most important thing affecting your health right now?. Share this at the beginning of the consultation. Remember to wear loose clothing that makes examination easier.

#### 5. Get to the point

Include a summary of why you are there for consultation. They need to know your symptoms – 'I've got a cough and fever, rather than 'I think I have a chest infection'. Avoid vagueness and try to describe what you are feeling. Tell the GP what you are expecting from the consultation – (reassurance, medical certificate, medicine, referral), or if you are worried it is something serious. Don't leave without an answer to your main question.

#### 6. Give a recap

If you are in the doctor's surgery for followup test results, give 10 seconds of why you are there – for instance, 'I've been feeling tired and came to get my results. I'm worried I have anaemia'.

#### 7. What happened, when?

It helps if you establish a chronology – what order things occurred in, and over what period of time. The GP might ask when you last felt well. Avoid too much extraneous detail, but do mention if big life events may be impacting your health.

#### 8. It is okay to suggest treatment ideas

If you have read about a new drug, share with your GP. Remember many drug trials are reported by the media at an early stage.

#### 9. Check your understanding

By the end of your appointment you should have agreed on a way forward and it is the GPs job to make sure you are satisfied. It can be helpful to discuss the next steps. The GP will also do a 'safety netting', to make sure that you know what to do if things get worse.

#### 10. Raise small concerns early

If you are not convinced by what you're being told, you can see another GP. You can also complain, but think about sharing your concerns first with the GP before escalating to a high authority.

#### Councillor Anna Greco

Over the past 6 months, I've been focused on understanding Willoughby Council's financial reports, especially in light

of the upcoming decision on whether to proceed with a Special Rate Variation (SRV). My background as a Chartered Accountant has been helpful in grasping the complexities of Council's operations and how it impacts residents financially.

In recent years, Council has faced financial challenges, with inflation costs outpacing revenue growth. In this 2023 Financial Year, Willoughby City Council reported an operating deficit of \$2.8 million. Although the current net asset base can meet immediate obligations, maintaining current service levels in the future is not financially sustainable.

Preliminary analysis of community feedback shows support for an SRV over a significant reduction in community services. For your reference, a 15% SRV would result in an estimated increase of \$3.13 per week for the average ratepayer and restore Council's capacity not only to maintain its community services but also to provide much-requested streetscape maintenance.

As a Willoughby Council ratepayer, I feel fortunate, and I believe that an SRV is necessary for Council to continue providing valued community services. If you have any questions regarding the proposed SRV, I will be pleased to hear from you.

### **MAYOR'S REPORT**

# Mayor Tanya Taylor provides an update on Naremburn goings-on.



It was lovely to see Naremburn shopping village transformed into a community space full of food, music, fun and great times by our Naremburn neighbours and local businesses at the most recent Tastes of Naremburn Festival in September. I look

forward to the next fun filled event harnessing the Naremburn community spirit.

Council is forging ahead with the Naremburn Village Upgrade which will provide easier access for pedestrians, cyclists, and bus passengers and enhance amenities to improve and extend visitation time to support local businesses. \$750.000 has been received from the Commonwealth Government to assist in funding the streetscape upgrade works. Stakeholder and business engagement conducted earlier this year has been vital in driving the design development. Thank you to everyone who participated in our engagement activities and participated in this process. Onsite surveys to establish underground service locations and for seeking external approvals for construction work are now complete and final design documents for the tender are scheduled for issue late 2023.

At its meeting on 27 November 2023, Council selected a 15% increase as its preferred rate rise option for 2024/25, which includes the NSW Government rate peg of 5%. The proposed rate rise will allow Council to allocate an additional \$2 million a year in additional cleaning, care and beautification projects in parks, cycling and walking routes and town centres, and for tree planting and maintenance programs. Council will now commence preparing a Special Rate Variation application to the NSW Government in line with the preferred rate rise. The application will need to be approved at a Council meeting scheduled for 30 January 2024, before being lodged with the NSW Government.

Council also voted to exhibit a revised Long Term Financial Plan 2023-2033 (LTFP) and Delivery Program 2022-26 which reflects this rate increase. I would like to thank members of our community that participated in the consultation process and provided valuable feedback to Council.

The **large-scale tree vandalism and investigation at Castle Cove** has sparked concerns over tree protection both within our LGA and across the State. Council agreed to put forward a motion at the Local Government NSW conference for the NSW Government to urgently undertake a review of the legislative regime for tree protection and to seek increased penalties and deterrents, including increased fines and custodial sentences for destruction of trees in NSW. The review should identify opportunities to better coordinate tree protection across NSW, along with improved education and awareness around the importance of tree protection to build stronger community support. I really do believe more needs to be done in this area to protect our trees and natural bushland areas.

The piling for the construction of **the Willoughby Leisure Centre Upgrade** is now complete. Due to the Centre's location on a former landfill site, it was always envisaged that this stage of the project would be complex. The removal of contaminated soil commenced in July 2023 and will continue until the end of the year. This process is being managed by a licensed asbestos removal contractor in accordance with the Asbestos Management Plan (AMP). The disposal of this soil strictly adheres to environmental regulations at a licensed asbestos waste facility. You can find more details in the Asbestos Management Plan (AMP), available in the Supporting Documents section the project page on our website where you can also watch the latest time lapse video showing the site works undertaken since June 2023. The next phase of the works involve constructing the substructure and pouring the concrete slabs.

As the year comes to a close, I wish you all a safe and joyful festive season and many happy returns for the New Year.

# *Residents Unite to Fight Discredited Toll Road Tunnel*

The looming impacts of the Western Harbour Tunnel Toll Road project (WHT) are still a major concern to the community if a meeting held at North Sydney Town Hall is any indication.

The very short notice meeting held by Bay Precinct in conjunction with Naremburn Progress Association on 21 November attracted a crowd of about 110 residents from the Willoughby and North Sydney area. Its purpose was to call on the state government to urgently reassess the Western Harbour Tunnel Toll Road and Warringah Freeway Upgrade.

A letter and petition campaign to halt and reassess the toll road were launched at the meeting and has had a strong start with residents sending several hundred email letters to NSW and Federal ministers.

Stephanie, a Cammeray resident, tearfully spoke about the horrific impact that the early works construction was having on her life, including frequent noise throughout the night, sleep deprivation, dust impact on her asthmatic child and workers parking residents out of their own streets.

Residents heard from two main speakers, Paul Walter; Convenor of Bay Precinct, and Larissa Penn; President of Naremburn Progress Association, that preliminary works for the project have caused extensive damage including loss of heritage listed parkland and thousands of trees.

However, main work on the harbour toll road tunnel has not yet begun and now is the time for the state government to reassess the project's viability and to remediate the damage. The speakers convincingly outlined the rationale for the reassessment by what was called the "Four S's" -

**SPACE –** Beaches Link has been cancelled yet its infrastructure continues to be built.

The government should address the space deficit by deleting planned Beaches Link Infrastructure and returning land to the community. The return of lost open space and trees is a condition of consent for the project, but the government shows no sign of meeting these conditions.

**SENSE -** The WHT had a marginal Benefit Cost Ratio of 1.2 to 1.3 prior to covid and that has likely deteriorated since then. Refer the project to the NSW Auditor General and Infrastructure NSW to re-establish its cost/benefits.

**STREETS -** The WHT forces commuters to enter the toll road system at locations determined by their destination. The result is increased traffic delays at local intersections. The widespread local traffic issues must be addressed by reassessing the freeway configuration.

**SMOG -** immediately re-assess the pollution levels modelled including to high rise homes. The area already experiences pollution in excess of WHO guidelines and the WHT would add further to this putting the health of residents at risk.

The recent opening of the WestConnex interchange at Rozelle has caused traffic chaos in the inner west creating gridlock and turning local streets into parking lots. The WHT would be an extension of WestConnex and the chaos clearly demonstrates that the WHT needs reassessing

## DID YOU KNOW?

The exact origin of the name Naremburn is unknown. One possibility is that Naremburn is an anglicised version of the Aboriginal terms '*narra*', referring to forks, forking or forked, and '*burren*', which means creek or a similar feature.

Prior to development, Flat Rock Creek in Naremburn was joined by another creek creating a 'fork', so the Aboriginal terminology would have aptly described a significant geographical feature. This theory is strengthened considering that Naremburn referred to the entire district from the late 1800s, as opposed to just the town.

19 local businesses chipped in to give the community a chance to win great prizes on the day, with two raffles valued at over \$850 up for grabs, plus a silent auction.


